525 South Waiola, La Grange

The home of Kathleen and Frank Mungo is elegantly situated across from Waiola Park. Built in the late 1920's, this lovely English Normandy style brick home was part of the southern expansion of La Grange's residential area. Among many other unique features, the rope door molding, woodwork, and beamed ceilings are characteristics that have an interesting story behind them. Learn more on the tour!



313 South 8th Avenue, La Grange

Billy & Karin Carney own one of the few existing Ivanhoe models of the Sears Catalogue Homes. Built in 1912 it was still owned by the original descendants when the Carneys bought it in 2003. 301 West Cossitt, La Grange

Welcome to the home of Lauren and Jonas Robinson. This Art Deco beauty that sits in the heart of the La Grange historic district was built after a tragic fire destroyed the original victorian home in 1942. Historic fire photos, information about this home's historic residents and its famous architect will be shared as the current owners give you an unforgettable tour.



311 South 6th, La Grange

Majestically set back on over 2/3 acre is the home of Erin and Ryan Prindle. Built in 1912, it was designed by architect JC Lewellyn who later designed a prominent feature of the Lyons Twp High School North campus. The fabulous glass fireplace tiles by Orland Giannini are a must to see as are the many original features that have been lovingly preserved. Take the tour and learn more about this home, architect, and the North Campus.



103 South Stone, La Grange

Allison & Brice McDowell own this beautiful Queen Anne Victorian. The home features diamond pane leaded glass and a beautiful wrap around porch. Built in 1892 it once served as a boarding house and later was the home of the first woman to do a very important and unusual job in 1944. Attend the tour to see and learn more!
